## Refugee Resettlement Program – Dan Lester

The Diocese of Jefferson City has been involved in refugee resettlement for 45 years. This program is now under the direction of Catholic Charities of North and Central Missouri. The diocese has supported the resettlement of over 5,000 in the last 45 years. In the last 7 years many of the refugees have been from the Congo. Since the end of August, the diocese has resettled 281 refugees from Afghanistan, with 8 more to fly in next week.

The legal definition of refugee is someone who is forced to flee due to persecution, fear of persecution; either religious, tribal, or political.

The United Nations has boots on the ground to identify people eligible for resettlement. Only 1% of refugees ever see resettlement in another country. There are approximately 6 million refugees worldwide and more in migration.

The National organization involved in resettlement is the Department of Health and wellness. This department contracts with 9 faith-based agencies for resettlement of refugees. One of the faith groups is the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). The USCCB turns to agencies like Catholic Charities to resettle refugees.

Until this year the most refugees resettled in the diocese has been 200 in 2016 before the US basically closed the borders to refugees or at least severely decreased the number allowed into the US. This year Catholic Charities of our diocese has resettled over 300 since September. So more than a years' worth in the last few months. In late August the USCCB asked how many refugees could CCCNM take. Settled on 300 and have had 289 already resettled or arriving next week. October/November were the heaviest months. The refugees arrive at the Columbia airport.

Catholic Charities is responsible for providing a roof, clothing, culturally appropriate food, furniture and employment and medical care. ESL classes as well as a wide variety of comprehensive services are provided. Sponsors also help enculturate them to America by helping with shopping and socialization. Some of the Afghanistan refugees speak perfect English as they were the interpreters for our military. The needs will vary as some who come from rural, agricultural areas may not even be able to read their native language. The goal is to have them become independent as soon as possible and not depend on Social Services.

They are basically fleeing violence and war. Looking for peaceful lives. Catholic Charities also works on reunification of extended families. Maybe some family members were sent to a different military base. Looking to provide them with natural ties if possible.

Currently, the bulk of refugees are in Columbia; Sacred Heart in Columbia has 2 families and they already are involved in resettlement of African refugees and have an ESL program. Jefferson City has 26 and the Fulton Rotary club has about 30. Catholic Charities is looking for

community sponsorship by churches, individuals, and civic organizations. Sponsorship has unique challenges such as learning about Afghan culture, getting Alwal (sp) meat (similar to Kosher meat for Jews). The refugees need people to engage with them one on one.

There are fewer agencies resettling refugees as between 2017 and 2020 refugees were not allowed to enter.

Housing is subsidized for 3-6 months. Hopefully working in that time span, more permanent housing can be found. Refugees want to be independent and work. Then they pay their own rent or buy a home. Not to downplay the affordable housing crisis but CC has not had a hard time finding housing. CC has a great relationship with MU. The most recent refugees were

housed in empty graduate student housing. Of course, this was short term but helped while more permanent housing can be secured.

He ended by accepting refugees it doesn't mean we are not securing our borders and keeping our citizens safe. Refugees are vetted before being resettled. Many have spent years in camps. The Afghan refugees have been expedited as Kabul and the country fell quickly. We have an obligation to help those who kept our soldiers safe.
